Dr. Bach succumbs

Funeral services were held here Monday for Dr. Bert Clarence Bach, 91, who died March 3 at the Good Samaritan Hospital in Lexington. The Rev. James Erwin offi-

ciated at the rites, held at the Graham Memorial Pres-

byterian Church.

Burial was in Lexington Cemetery, Lexington, beside the graves of Dr. Bach's brothers.

Dr, Bach was born in the "ugged Wuicksand area of Breathitt County. He was the oldest son of a hill farmer and storekeeper, Hiram D. Bach, and Mrs. Mary Jane Bach.

Lees College at Jackson for two years and served in the Pacific for three years with the Army Medical Corps during the Philippine Insurrection. The first two years of Dr.

Bach's medical practice centered around the logging camp of a narrow guage railroad in Breathitt County. the same year as the railroad and he always took pride in his position as local surgeon for the L&N Railroad.

Dr. Bach was recalled to the army during World War I and was released to return to Letcher County when families here were ravaged by the flu epidemic of 1918.

He rode horseback up every hollow within a 40-mile radius of Whitesburg.

Dr. Bach served on the boards of directors of several schools (including Lees College and Stuart Robinson) and served briefly as mayor of Whitesburg. He was one of the first two (11 ars of Graham Memorial F .sbyterian Church and he served as a director of the Bank of Whitesburg from its founding until his death. Although he preferred privacy, he was a public figure because of his

service to these institutions. He took great pride in his native land, particularly in Quicksand, Letcher County
